Law changes helped push completed foreclosures down

CoLocAffrs 12/4 – Completed foreclosures are set to end the year down from 2007, at least partly due to two statutory changes this year. There were 14 percent fewer completed foreclosures during the period ending September 30 than during the same period last year. According to a report released today by the Colorado Department of Local Affairs—Division of Housing, there were 9 percent fewer completed foreclosures during the third quarter this year than during the third quarter of 2007. However, completed foreclosures jumped 66 percent from the second quarter to the third quarter.

There were 6,454 new completed foreclosures during the third quarter of 2008, bringing the total for the first three quarters of the year to 16,246. There were 19,025 completed foreclosures during the same period last year. There were 25,320 completed foreclosures during the full year of 2007 which was a 40 percent increase over 2006. The Division's report predicts a decrease of 13 percent for foreclosures during 2008.

"2006 and 2007 saw big increases in foreclosure filings of 30 and 40 percent, so a 14 percent decrease so far this year makes us cautiously optimistic about the future," said Kathi Williams, Director of the Colorado Division of Housing. "There are still many reasons for concern, but this is good news."

While the report expects the statewide total for foreclosures to be down this year, the report shows some counties did experience more foreclosures when compared against last year. In year-over-year comparisons between the third quarters of 2007 and 2008, Boulder, Broomfield, Douglas, El Paso, Jefferson, and Larimer Counties all reported increases. El Paso topped the list with a 26 percent increase in foreclosures over the third quarter of last year. Denver County reported the largest decrease, with a decline of 26

percent compared to the third quarter of last year. Adams County reported a 19 percent drop, and Weld County reported a 20 percent drop.

In recent years, Weld, Denver, and Adams Counties have experienced some of the highest rates of foreclosure activity and growth rates.

Observers note that there may be several reasons for the drop in the rate of growth in foreclosure filings. The Colorado Foreclosure Hotline (1-877-601-HOPE) has been in place for two years now, and according to Williams, almost 4,000 households during 2008 have been able to avoid foreclosure through the hotline and its member agencies.

"If those 4,000 households had foreclosed, we'd be looking at an increase instead of a decrease in foreclosures," said Williams.

According to the report, factors other than foreclosure prevention and loss mitigation have also had a role in driving down foreclosure totals. Changes in Colorado law that took effect on January 1st created a transitional period during March and April during which very few foreclosure sales at auction could occur. This drove down totals in the first and second quarter foreclosure totals that have affected the annual statistics and created an impression that many fewer borrowers were defaulting on their loans that was the case. A new law that took effect in August also affected foreclosure filing statistics in similar ways.

Even as growth rates moderate in many areas, high foreclosure rates persist. The highest rate was found in Adams County where there was 1 foreclosure for every 58 households. In Denver County there was 1 filing for every 73 households, and 1 for every 74 households in Weld County. There was one foreclosure for every 102 households in Pueblo County.

The latest data reinforces past claims that high

sure filing for every 756 households, and La Plata County reported 1 for every 992 households. Garfield County reported 1 for every 5,079 households. The Colorado Division of Housing collects foreclosure data from

National Influenza Vaccination Week set for Dec. 8-14

PbloHealth 12/2 – In conjunction with National Influenza Vaccination Week, December 8 through 14, the Pueblo City-County Health Department reminds all individuals to get their annual flu vaccination in order to protect their health and that of their friends and family. The Pueblo City-County Health Department is promoting National Influenza Vaccination Week by offering free flu shots to babies six months to three years old on Wednesday, Dec. 10 from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m.

“National Influenza Vaccination Week is a reminder that the flu vaccine is the best way to protect yourself and your family against the flu. Many individuals get a flu shot in the fall during September and Oc-

tober, people need to know that it's a good idea to get a flu shot even in December or January as flu cases in Colorado peak in February and cases have been reported as late as May,” stated Marlo Brumbaugh, R.N., public health clinic manager at the Pueblo City-County Health Department.

The first hospitalized case of influenza (commonly referred to as the “flu”) in Colorado was reported late November from Colorado Springs. This virus may be prevented with a flu shot.

Babies six months to three years old who have not gotten a shot this flu season can get a shot Wednesday, December 10, 2008 at the Pueblo City-County Health Department, 151 Central

Main Street, from 9:00a.m. to 6:00p.m. Parents are requested to bring in their child's immunization records for review of other vaccines the child may need. Walk-ins are accepted or appointments can be made by calling 719-583-4380.

This flu shot clinic for babies is in response to the Center for Disease Control's (CDC) 2008-2009 recommendation regarding vaccinating everyone 18 years to six months old, as there is a growing belief that by vaccinating school age youth and babies (especially those who are cared for out of their homes) community-wide spread of the flu may decrease.

Influenza is a serious disease. Every year about 36,000 Americans die from this illness,

and about 200,000 people are hospitalized. “The best way to commemorate this week is to get yourself and your loved ones vaccinated against the flu,” added Brumbaugh.

Flu shots are still available throughout Pueblo. Individuals looking for flu shots are encouraged to call their physicians or dial 2-1-1 from a land line or (719) 583-6611 from a cell phone who is hosting flu shot clinic availability for Pueblo.

Flu shots are especially important for young children, for people who are 50 or older, for pregnant women, and for anyone with a chronic health condition like asthma, heart disease, or diabetes. Catch the holiday spirit, not the flu. Get vaccinated now.

“The single best way to prevent the flu is to get vaccinated,” Brumbaugh said. “However, there are other ways to protect against the flu. They include:

- Wash your hands.
- Avoid contact with people who are sick.
- Stay home when you are sick.
- Cover your mouth and nose when coughing or sneezing.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth.

Sponsored by CDC, National Influenza Vaccination Week is designed to raise awareness of the importance of continuing influenza (flu) vaccination, as well as foster greater use of flu vaccine through November, December and beyond.

Unexpected effects related to global warming from certain leaf decay

CSU 12/4 – A Colorado State University researcher spearheaded a global experiment to determine if unseen species found in soil are important on a global scale in increasing leaf decay and making a greater impact in warm regions' climate change. The findings: those species make a significant impact.

Soil animals and their importance have long been ignored. Many scientists have wondered, do they really have any significance from beyond the backyard?

Results show that soil animal impacts are climate dependent; they increase leaf decay in temperate and wet tropical locations and have neutral effects in other regions. This suggests that in ecosystems where climates are projected to be warmer and wetter, the effects could be faster decomposition rates and higher releases of carbon dioxide.

Alternatively, global changes affecting soils such as land-use change, which alter soil animal diversity or biomass, may negatively impact decomposition rates in warm, wet climatic regions.

The study, published in the latest issue of “Global Change Biology,” was directed by Diana Wall, ecosystem scientist and director of CSU's School of Global Environmental Sustainability. Wall organized a

volunteer scientific network around the world to see if soil animals matter beyond local scales.

For many years, scientists questioned the importance of soil animals in the release of carbon dioxide to the atmosphere as the animals help dead leaves and wood rot. Without soil organisms to rip, tear, shred and dissolve leaves and wood, the falling leaves would stack up on the ground causing less carbon to be stored in soil. As leaves and wood rot, they break down into smaller fragments, and at every step of decay, carbon is released as atmospheric carbon dioxide, used as food for organisms or stored in soil. Too much global atmospheric carbon dioxide contributes to greenhouse gases.

For the experiment, Wall's lab worked to assemble more than 2,000 mesh bags filled with dead plant material and shipped them to scientists worldwide where they were placed on the surface of soil. Scientists identified more than 80,000 animals found in 30 sites in 18 countries around the world, from Namibia to Brazil and Canada to Russia. Soil animals include earthworms, termites, pill bugs, millipedes, centipedes, ants and smaller, less well-known invertebrates like mites, springtails and nematode roundworms.

“Climate and plant chemistry are primary drivers of terrestrial decomposition rates, and the release of soil carbon dioxide to the atmosphere is factored into global decomposition models,” said Wall. “The role of soil fauna in plant litter decomposition at the global scale was unresolved, although evidence indicates they are key actors in determining how quickly dead plant litter will decay and rot at local scales.”

The study's findings further support the need to include soil animal data in global climate change models, particularly when predicting how fast dying vegetation will decay and release carbon dioxide to the air.

In terrestrial ecosystems, biological diversity of soils is poorly known, but it is estimated to be greater than in above-ground systems. Soil biota is known to regulate vital ecosystem processes such as carbon sequestration, nutrient cycling and decomposition.

Mark Bradford from the University of Georgia, Athens was a lead co-author of the study.

Earth Talk ... Q&A

DEAR EARTHTALK: I caught the tail end of a discussion about "ecopsychology" recently on the

radio, something about the negative impacts of people not communing with nature enough, spending too much time watching TV, sitting at computers, etc... Can you enlighten?—Bridget W., Seattle, WA

The term ecopsychology, first coined by writer and theorist Theodore Roszak in his 1992 book, *Voice of the Earth*, is loosely defined as the connection between ecology and human psychology. Roszak argues that humans can heal what he calls their "psychological alienation" from nature and build a more sustainable society if they recognize that we all have an innate emotional bond with the natural world.

The basic premise is that we operate under an illusion that people are separate from nature, and that humans are more apt to derive comfort and even inspiration from contact with the natural world—with which they evolved over the millennia—than with the relatively recent construct of modern urban society. Distancing ourselves from nature, Roszak maintains, has negative psychological consequences for people and also leads to ecological devastation at the hands of a society that, as a result, lacks empathy for nature.

In a more recent essay called "Ecopsychology: Eight Principles," Roszak, who went on to start the non-profit Ecopsychology Institute, states that the core of the mind is the ecological unconscious, which, if repressed, can lead to an "insane" treatment of nature. "For ecopsychology, repression of the ecological unconscious is the deepest root of collusive madness in industrial society," he writes, adding that "open access to the ecological unconscious is the path to sanity."

While many psychotherapists have adopted aspects of ecopsychology in treating various mental illnesses and psychological disorders, the teachings of Roszak and other contributors to the still-evolving field can be helpful even for those not in need of a therapist's care. John V. Davis, a Naropa University professor who teaches and writes about ecopsychology, for example, says that meditating in the outdoors, participating in wilderness retreats, involving oneself in nature-based festivals or celebrations of the seasons or other natural phenomena, joining in Earth-nurturing activities such as environmental restoration or advocacy work, and spending time around animals (including pets, which have been shown to have healing effects with the elderly and with people with psychological disabilities) are just a few ways in which the discipline can be used by everyday people to the benefit of their psychological health.

Getting kids involved with nature and the outdoors is viewed by ecopsychology fans as key to their development, especially in the technological age we occupy now. Richard Louv, author of the book, *Last Child in the Woods: Saving Our Children from Nature Deficit Disorder*, argues that kids are so plugged into television and video games that they've lost their connection to the natural world. This disconnect, Louv maintains, has led not only to poor physical fitness among our youth (including obesity), but also long-term mental and spiritual health problems. His work has sparked a worldwide movement to introduce more kids to the wonders of nature through various planned and spontaneous activities.

DEAR EARTHTALK: I understand

that Toyota is planning to sell a plug-in Prius that will greatly improve the car's already impressive fuel efficiency. Will I be able to convert my older (2006) Prius to make it a plug-in hybrid vehicle?—Albert D. Rich, Kamuela, HI

Toyota is readying a limited run of a plug-in Prius, which can average 100 miles per gallon, for use in government and commercial fleets starting in 2009. Toyota will monitor how these cars, which will have high efficiency lithium ion batteries that haven't been fully tested yet, will hold up under everyday use.

Essentially, a plug-in version of the Prius reverses the roles of the two motors under the hood. The regular Prius relies more on its gas engine, switching to (or combining) use of the electric motor in slow traffic, to maintain cruising speed, and when idling or backing up. The car doesn't need to plug in because its battery stays charged by the gas motor and by the motion of the wheels and brakes. The plug-in will primarily use its electric motor, allowing commuters to go to and from work every day fully on the electric charge, saving the gas engine for longer trips that exceed the distance the car can go on electricity alone.

Toyota has made no announcement yet as to when consumers will be able to buy a plug-in; that depends largely on the results of the field test of the fleet version. But owners of a current or past model don't need to wait. Those with automotive mechanical skills can convert their Priuses to plug-ins themselves.

"The conversion is an easy DIY [do-it-yourself] project that you can do for about \$4,000, if you choose to use sealed lead acid batteries," says Houston-based Jim Philippi, who converted his Prius last year, using instructions he downloaded for free from the Electric Auto Association's PriusPlus.org website. Philippi recommends that DIYers consult Google's RechargeIT.org as well for useful background information.

For those less inclined to a DIY, several companies now sell ready-made kits (some also have kits for converting Ford Escape Hybrid SUVs). Ontario-based Hymotion sells plug-in kits for Prius model years 2004-2008 for around \$10,000 via contracted distributors/installers in San Francisco, Seattle and elsewhere. Other providers include Plug-In Conversions Corp., Plug-In Supply, EDrive Systems, Energy Control Systems Engineering Inc. and OEMtek. All typically work with select garages that specialize.

One potential worry about conversions is whether or not Toyota will honor the warranty that came with the original vehicle. The California Cars Initiative (CCI), which has converted several hybrids to plug-ins for research and demonstration purposes (sorry, they're not for sale), says the carmaker needs to clarify the matter, since hybrid cars typically have four or five separate warranties. There is legal precedent, CCI says, that modifications cannot completely void warranties—only the part(s) affected by a retrofit.

If you're looking to convert, keep in mind that such a move is not about cost-savings, as it will take some time for fuel savings to justify the upfront cost of even a DIY. Most people interested in such a conversion are doing it for the sake of the environment, not their pocketbooks.

Luckily, growing environmental concerns—and consumer demand—means that plenty of safe and green-friendly items are available for those willing to do a little more than just walk around the closest shopping mall.

For kids' items, Oompa Toys (*oompa.com*) is hard to beat. The Wisconsin-based company offers thousands of child- and Earth-safe items. On Oompa's easy-to-use website you can buy products ranging from toys, dollhouses and stuffed animals to learning games, musical instruments and art supplies to kitchen play accessories, kids' furniture and tricycles, many items made with organic or recycled materials.

Another interesting online source for kids' toys is Washington-based Earthentree (*earthentree.com*), which sells dozens of pull toys, rattles, stackers and other goodies to stimulate young hands and minds. All of their products are handcrafted by "fair trade" (fairly compensated) artisans in India using sustainably harvested wood and natural vegetable-based dyes. And Hazelnut Kids (*hazelnutkids.com*) specializes in natural, earth-friendly wooden and organic cotton toys for kids and babies, and even offers gift-wrapping with recycled and recyclable paper.

For grown-up gifts, EcoArtware (*eco-artware.com*) sells a variety of items made from recycled and natural materials, from bath and kitchen accessories to pet products to jewelry, including many hand-made items. Everybodygreen (*everybodygreen.com*) is another good source for green-friendly jewelry. The company's No Plastic charm bracelets are made with corn starch-based resin, natural herbal tea dye and recycled brass. For those holiday parties you might be attending, wine aficionados might appreciate a bottle of Boisset Family Estates' Yellow Jersey pinot noir (*yellowjerseywine.com*), which comes from France in a 100 percent recycled (and recyclable) plastic bottle.

Looking for fair trade arts and crafts? Gifts with Humanity (*giftswithhumanity.com*) sells clothing, home décor, jewelry and more from artists in Asia, Africa and Central and South America. Organic Bug (*organicbug.com*) also sells fair trade items and other natural and organic products from clothing to home décor items to travel accessories. Other websites worth visiting for fair trade and/or green-friendly gifts include *peacefulvalleygreetings.com*, *greenfeet.com*, *pristineplanet.com*, *nokiagreenstore.com*, *gaiam.com*, *acacia.com* and *vivaterra.com*. A simple Google search for "green holiday gifts" will turn up many more.

Another approach to the holidays, of course, for the sake of lessening one's footprint and tightening the belt in a downturned economy, is to eschew traditional gift-giving in favor of donating to a local or national environmental group in the name of a friend or loved one. This can be accomplished by visiting the websites of your favorite green groups and making your way to their "Donate" page, or by visiting *justgive.org* or *worldofgood.com* (by eBay), both which facilitate contributions to worthwhile charities.
